Farmers Emission Reduction Toolkit update

Our sustainable agriculture project team have been conducting research into promising strategies that could help farmers reduce their on-farm emissions – and realise a number of additional benefits along the way.

Depending on the strategy selected, these benefits could include:

- ⇒ reduced fertiliser expenses
- ⇒ protection of valuable topsoil
- ⇒ reduced energy costs
- ⇒ increased biodiversity on farm
- ⇒ attraction of beneficial insects
- ⇒ healthier water points on farm
- ⇒ healthier waterways off farm for our children and grandchildren to enjoy.

Key areas the project team are focussing on include:

- Energy management
- Dung beetles
- Optimising grazing rotations
- Multispecies forage crops
- Water management
- Revegetation and shelter belts

The project, supported by AgriFutures Australia, seeks to create a series of decision-making pathways and tools to help farmers evaluate the available options and which ones would be most suitable on their property.

A small working group of local farmers will soon get together to provide feedback on the initial work and later to test a range of tools.

Multispecies Demonstration Results Zoom

In August, our Sustainable Ag team agronomist Jade Killoran shared the results of her multispecies demonstration site – a challenging heavy soil site in south

west Victoria, in an online presentation. This was followed by questions and a lively discussion which included local farmers at various stages of their sustainable ag journey.

Gilson College students lend a hand

In September, we were visited by four groups of students from Gilson College in Melbourne, who spent time with various local businesses learning about different ways to be of service to a community.

Accompanied by members of the Camperdown-Timboon Rail Trail Committee of Management, we took the first group of students down to the Rail Trail to learn how to remove ivy. A later count by the committee showed that the team cut ivy from approximately 55 trees, with some of those trees being quite significant in size. Another group added to this massive effort a couple of days later.

The second group to visit us helped local land-holders Claire and Rick Clark plant around 800 seedlings provided to them as part of HDLN's Biofund program.



Claire shared her thoughts on the experience, 'We were very fortunate to have the help of Heytesbury Landcare and students from Gilson College to plant up a new shelter belt on our property. It was great to see the kids interested in the area and the different plants we were using. All in all a great experience.'

The final group to visit us spent the afternoon at the HDLN office assembling around 1300 tree guards.

Spending time with young people from a city background provided everyone with an opportunity to share different insights and life experiences, while doing something positive for the local environment.
